New Adult Safeguarding Referral Form

- In draft at present
- Building on collaborative relationship with social services in Southwark
- Responding to our requests for (more) feedback following referrals this should now be standard IN ALL CASES (including those rejected) – I have also asked to try to ensure details of a NAMED CONTACT is passed to referrer for ongoing correspondence and updates
- Considering some cases that may fall outside traditional thresholds (eg modern day slavery, forced marriage, honour based violence)
- Considering coercion/threats as an influence in capacity to give consent
- We have opportunity to feed back by end of this week before it goes live (or changes are made)



Domestic Abuse Act 2021

- Due to come into law 2021/22 (though no date set yet looking like 2022)
- Domestic Abuse Act 2021: overarching factsheet GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)
- To strengthen the support for victims of abuse by statutory agencies
- One clause in particular that GP practices need to be especially aware of



The act proposes to:

- create a statutory definition of domestic abuse, emphasising that domestic abuse is not just physical violence, but can also be emotional, controlling or coercive, and economic abuse
- establish in law the office of Domestic Abuse Commissioner and set out the Commissioner's functions and powers
- provide for a new Domestic Abuse Protection Notice and Domestic Abuse
 Protection Order
- place a duty on local authorities in England to provide accommodation based support to victims of domestic abuse and their children in refuges and other safe accommodation
- prohibit perpetrators of abuse from cross-examining their victims in person in the civil and family courts in England and Wales
- create a statutory presumption that victims of domestic abuse are eligible for special measures in the criminal, civil and family courts



- clarify the circumstances in which a court may make a barring order under section 91(14)
 of the Children Act 1989 to prevent family proceedings that can further traumatise
 victims
- extend the controlling or coercive behaviour offence to cover post-separation abuse.
- extend the offence of disclosing private sexual photographs and films with intent to cause distress (known as the "revenge porn" offence) to cover threats to disclose such material
- create a new offence of non-fatal strangulation or suffocation of another person.
- clarify by restating in statute law the general proposition that a person may not consent to the infliction of serious harm and, by extension, is unable to consent to their own death
- extend the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the criminal courts in England and Wales,
 Scotland and Northern Ireland to further violent and sexual offences
- provide for a statutory domestic abuse perpetrator strategy



- enable domestic abuse offenders to be subject to polygraph testing as a condition of their licence following their release from custody
- place the guidance supporting the Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme ("Clare's law") on a statutory footing.
- Provide that all eligible homeless victims of domestic abuse automatically have 'priority need' for homelessness assistance
- ensure that where a local authority, for reasons connected with domestic abuse, grants a new secure tenancy to a social tenant who had or has a secure lifetime or assured tenancy (other than an assured shorthold tenancy) this must be a secure lifetime tenancy
- prohibit GPs and other health professionals in general practice from charging a victim of domestic abuse for a letter to support an application for legal aid
- provide for a statutory code of practice relating to the processing of domestic abuse data for immigration purposes

Refugees and Asylum Seekers in Southwark



- Prior to covid-19 we had 1x Initial Accommodation Centre in Southwark, with residents' stays relatively short (a few weeks) and their medical needs being met by the GSTT Health Inclusion Team
- Now, with the pandemic, and the new sudden influx of Afghan Refugees in the summer this has grown to 7 hotels, and many are remaining within them for an indefinite period, being registered at numerous practices across the Borough.
- Situation constantly changing, and more people expected.

Afghan Refugees in Southwark: Guidance from NHSEI



- "Facilitate GP registration for all"
- "Ensure a Robust and Enhanced health assessment on registration including assessment of trauma/mental health needs"
- "Assessment of any trauma and safeguarding concerns will be a key priority"
 - People are likely to have experienced significant trauma and may need immediate safeguards to be put in place
 - They could also be at risk of victimisation and exploitation once in the UK
- Be aware of high prevalence of multi-Drug resistant organisms due to overuse of antibiotics in Afghanistan and in other parts of the world"
- Offer Covid-19 vaccinations and any needed to come in line with UK schedule vaccinations
- Screen for communicable diseases including TB



Reasonable Adjustments by Practices

- Although length of stay uncertain, permanent registration advised
- No need for proof of ID/address or immigration status
- Consider there may not be access or ability to use internet, or possibly even paper literacy for filling in registration forms
- Consider the need for face to face appointments as opposed to telephone or video consults
- Always use an independent interpreter if unable to speak English
- Consult patients alone to get their true story
- Don't assume they are in a place of safety in their current accommodation

 if you or they have concerns, it is your duty to raise them with social care.
- Consider asking if the individual feels safe at each consultation, as may be vulnerable to new forms of exploitation and/or abuse



- 2 Bridging Hotels (about 180 residents in total)
- 5 IACs (over 1000 residents in total)
 - Unable to share the names/locations as have been advised this has to remain confidential, for safety reasons
- Managed by "Clearsprings Ready Homes"
- Commissioned by The Home Office
- Hotel staff are apparently safeguarding trained (and we hope DBS checked) but it is really the responsibility
 of us as trained professionals to look to identify many hidden needs/safeguarding concerns and make robust
 and appropriate referrals.
- DO NOT ASSUME SOMEONE ELSE HAS DONE THIS
- Unclear length of stays but anticipated many months.
- Accommodation/facilities often cramped, shared between men, women and children who are strangers to
 each other, and hotel staff are being put in particular positions of power need to consider the
 safety/impact of current accommodation, not just the impact of past trauma previous cases of serious
 harm in these centres.

Making a Safeguarding Referral for a Bridging Hotel/IAC Resident



- Essentially the same as for any
 - If you are worried about a child or adult in the bridging hotels, you must tell Southwark Council via a referral form and usual referral routes.
- BUT ALSO
 - You need to inform the Home Office

- Adult social care for refugees/asylum seekers
- Asylum seekers have No Recourse to Public Funds (NRPF) but in some circumstances where their safety is at risk or they have been victims of abuse, there is still a statutory obligation to intervene, and any safeguarding concern you have MUST be referred.
- There is a designated safeguarding team in Southwark for those with NRPF, so it may be worth sending your referrals for asylum seekers to them:
 - NRPF@southwark.gov.uk (as in the new form, discussed earlier!)
- Refugees, including recently migrated Afghan refugees in Bridging Hotels, **DO** HAVE RECOURSE TO PUBLIC FUNDS. If they do not fall into one of the 3 other categories of care and support needs for adults, use:

OPPDContactteam@southwark.gov.uk

• I would suggest stipulating that they may have care and support needs by virtue of being refugees/asylum seekers with no choice in where they are being housed at the moment – under the jurisdiction of the Home Office.



Safe Surgeries Network

- Safe Surgeries Initiative Doctors of the World
- 26 practices now signed up in Southwark but aiming for a full house.
- Costs nothing
- Offers resources and advice to members to support inclusivity in the practice
 - Posters translated into 25 different languages
 - Advice line including knowledge on eligibility for funded secondary care in different circumstances when otherwise NRPF.
- Training for clinical and admin staff available if needed (free of charge)
